GAUDETE SUNDAY

THE FIRST LESSON

Reader A reading from the Prophet Isaiah.

The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; to provide for those who mourn in Zion— to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, to display his glory. They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall

raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations. For I the Lord love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them. Their descendants shall be known among the nations, and their offspring among the peoples; all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the Lord has

blessed. I will greatly rejoice in the Lord, my whole being shall exult in my God; for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

Gaudete Sunday

The third Sunday of Advent in the liturgy of the church year. The term is derived from the Latin opening words of the introit antiphon, "Rejoice (Gaudete) in the Lord always." The theme of the day expresses the joy of anticipation at the approach of the Christmas celebration. This theme reflects a lightening of the tone of the traditional Advent observance. This Sunday was also known as "Rose Sunday." It is not a required observance in the Episcopal Church, but it is often reflected by the practice of including a pink or rose-colored candle among the four candles of an Advent wreath.

Advent in Liturgy

There is a common theme in the Gospel readings of Advent. They focus on preparation or making straight the path of the Lord, and remind us of the importance of preparing our hearts for Our Savior and making room for Christ's presence in our lives. The liturgical color used in advent is blue (similar to the purple of Lent), and represents prayer, penance, and preparation for the coming of Christ both on Christmas Day and at the second coming.

An Advent Wreath

Advent wreaths are traditionally made from evergreen branches and have four candles with a fifth in the center. The evergreen color of the wreath stands for ongoing hope and life because Christ is alive among us, and through him we are given a life of grace, spiritual growth, and hope even in the midst of winter. The Advent wreath originated from a pagan European tradition of lighting candles during the winter to ask the sun god to return with light and warmth. The circle of the wreath is a geometric figure that has neither a beginning nor an end. It symbolizes that the love of God does not have a beginning or an end; it encompasses unity and eternity. It is a sign of the unending love of God and that loving our neighbors must never stop.

Gospels of the Liturgical Year

The new church year (Year B) starts with the season of Advent on December 2 & 3. We have spent the last year in liturgical Year A. It highlighted the Gospel of Matthew. In Year B, the primary gospel used is that of Mark. In Advent 2024, Year C will begin with its focus on the gospel of Luke. Through all liturgical years the gospel of John is a supplement to the year's gospel. In worship at St. James, we follow the **Revised Common Lectionary** and usually read Scripture lessons from the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible.

Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal." This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

The Historic Creed

We say the Creed as our response to the Word of God. In these historic words, we take ownership of the Creed's cosmic narrative about God's disclosure to humanity. It affirms the source of everything that is including the story of Jesus becoming human. Its conclusion affirms the work of the Holy Spirit in the church, in one baptism, and in our hope for the life to come. The Nicene Creed is a sign of unity with Christians throughout all times and places. Though originally composed at an ancient time (325 CE), it expresses key insights into the nature of God and creation. This version follows the Greek original precisely by saying "was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary," to emphasize that Mary was an active participant in the Incarnation. The words "and the Son," were not a part of the original Greek text of the Creed and are not included. At its General Convention of 1988 The Episcopal Church said they favored this omission. The decision was later approved by the Lambeth Conference of the Anglican Communion.

A pause in speaking the prayers is often taken during the Prayers of the People. At such times, you are invited to add your own intercessions to the prayers of the congregation either silently or aloud.

The Power of Prayer

Sharing announcements when we are together for worship is a sign of vital parish life. We try to balance that vigor with the current of liturgical energy which moves us from our initial gathering to the altar and the sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ. Brief, necessary announcements in this season attempts to allow the spirit of our worship prayer to continue unbroken.

The Peace

It has been associated with Romans 16:16, "Greet one another with a holy kiss," and similar passages.

Candles on the Advent Wreath

The three blue- and one rose -colored candle stand for the four weeks of Advent. The fifth, white candle in the center of the wreath is the Christ Candle. It is lit on Christmas Day. Candles have extensive ceremonial use in the Christian liturgical tradition. Lighted candles symbolize the light of Christ (or the light of the gospel); they remind us that the time and space of worship are sacred. The progressive lighting of the candles represents the expectation and hope surrounding our Savior's coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming at the end of the age when the reign of God will be established for ever.

Presider

We acclaim you, holy God, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death.

In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Holy God, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, Jesus lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose Jesus gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for Christ who died and rose for us, you sent the Holy Spirit, your own first gift for those who believe, to complete your work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

The Candle of Hope

The first candle is a symbol of the hope we have in Christ and so it is called the Hope candle.

The Candle of the Way

The second candle shows that Christ is the Way. Without God, humanity is lost. Christ is the Light of the world and shows us the way out of darkness.

The Candle of Joy

The rose-colored candle is illuminated on the third Sunday of Advent, which is known as Gaudete Sunday. This Sunday is a day for rejoicing and joy as the faithful draw near to the birth of Jesus. The only lasting Joy to be found in life on earth is through Christ. All other joy is fleeting and does not last.

The Candle of Peace

The fourth candle reminds that Jesus comes to bring Peace to the world and to people's hearts. Without Christ there is no peace in this world.

The Christ Candle

The fifth candle represents Christ himself who was born to save people. It is a celebration of the fulfilment of prophecy as represented in Christ's birth and hope in its final fulfilment when Christ comes again and establishes the reign of God for ever.

Eucharist

The sacrament of the Eucharist is the principal act of Christian worship in our church. The term is from the Greek, "thanksgiving." Jesus instituted the Eucharist at the Last Supper where he shared bread and wine at a sacred meal with his disciples. Christ's sacrifice is made present in the Eucharist, and in it we are united to his one self-offering. The grace bestowed in Holy Communion augments (deepens, increases) faith, forgives sin, and strengthens of our charity. Everyone who seeks a deeper knowledge of Christ is welcome to receive the sacrament.

Communion in One Kind

Our doctrine upholds the truth that the fullness of communion is available by receiving either the consecrated bread or wine. Communicants receive both the body and the blood in either the consecrated bread or the wine, though all are invited (as they are able) to receive both kinds. Our belief in the fullness of communion in one kind (bread or wine) is called the doctrine of concomitance. The term concomitance comes from the Latin, "to accompany."

Presider

When the hour had come for Jesus to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Almighty God, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and descent among the dead, proclaiming Christ's resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting Christ's coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

All We praise you, we bless you, we give thanks to you, and we pray to you, Lord our God.
