III. ELECTION INFORMATION AND NOMINEES

GENERAL INFORMATION

Everyone elected to a position at the Annual Meeting takes office immediately upon adjournment of the meeting. We vote by written ballot, except when there is only one nominee for an office. In that case, we may take a vote by show of hands.

VESTRY ELECTIONS

Information for and Expectations of Wardens and Vestry Members

Vestry members are well-prepared attendees of all vestry meetings. Regular attendance at worship services and parish events is expected. Vestry members lead the congregation in many ways, including through their participation and financial giving to the parish. All vestry members make an annual pledge and strive to tithe. They openly and transparently serve as official communicators between the Vestry and the congregation. They are a council of advice for the Rector. The vestry meetings are scheduled each month, except July. Its meetings are usually held on the third Thursday of the month at 6:00 PM in the lounge. There may be one vestry retreat each year. The February vestry meeting includes an orientation for new members. It is very important for all Vestry members to attend. It will be held on Thursday, February 15 at 6:00 PM.

Election of Members of the Vestry for a three (3) year term shall be by one ballot. Each elector may vote for as many nominees as there are positions to be filled. The appropriate number of nominees receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. (Article V. Section 2 . E.)

WARDENS, TREASURER, AND CLERK OF THE VESTRY ELECTIONS

SENIOR WARDEN (Elect one for a one-year term; maximum is 3 consecutive years.)

Joan Moore

I was confirmed as an Episcopalian at St. Stephen's, Wichita in 1998. My family joined St. James in 2003 when we moved to College Hill. I'm a proud mom to three girls: Gracie (25) who graduated from Elon University in North Carolina in 2021, and is now a second year law student at William & Mary Law School in Williamsburg, VA. PARISH DELEGATES & ALTERNATES ELECTIONS

Information for and Expectations of Delegates and Alternates

Delegates are members of the Southwest Convocation Board and the Diocesan Convention, and act as representatives of this parish, speaking for this parish and bringing information back to this parish. They shall attend all Southwest Convocation Board meetings and Diocesan Convention and report back to the Vestry within thirty days following adjournment of each. One responsibility of delegates and alternates is to review the apportionment schedule, to understand the annual diocesan mission plan, and to vote whether to approve the diocesan budget at the annual convention of the diocese. Therefore, Delegates and Alternates (along with parish clergy) attend all meetings of the Southwest Convocation. There will be three Saturday meetings in 2024.

Delegates attend Diocesan Convention which is held annually in October in Wichita. St. James Church pays for the convention registration fee, convention meals and hotel accommodations for Delegates. If a Delegate is unable to attend, then an Alternate attends in his/her place and receives reimbursement in that circumstance. New since 2020 will be the expectation that Delegates and Alternates will participate in meetings, conversations, and exchanges of information with the vestry for the purpose of being informed about parish circumstance and to report to the vestry of diocesan news.

Cast your vote for 2 individuals to serve as delegates for two year terms. The two individuals receiving the most votes will serve as Delegates and the other two individuals will serve as Alternates.



ENDOWMENT FUNDS BOARD ELECTIONS

Information for and Expectations of Members of the Endowment Funds Board

Members of the St. James Endowment Funds Board (EFB) are expected to receive and be familiar with the financial statements and legal documents of the Perpetual Memorial and Endowment Fund (PMEF). This responsibility assumes a basic understanding of financial investment. Members meet monthly at a mutually agreed date and time. Members discuss and propose long-term investment objectives and manage one of the parish's most important assets, the funds in the PMEF. The EFB makes quarterly reports to the vestry, recommends action, and manages transactions. The EFB will develop and implement programs (legacy society, planned giving, memorial giving) designed to grow the good which can be done for St. James Church through the PMEF.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE ELECTIONS

Information for and Expectations of Members of the Nominating Committee

Five members are elected annually to use their knowledge of the parish and familiarity with its members to create a 'slate' of nominees for elections to be held at our next Annual Meeting. The Nominating Committee is given an important responsibility by the parish. This is a serious task which has great influence on the ministry of the parish. The work must be prayerfully and confidentially undertaken. The committee begins work in August or September gathering suggested names for the positions to be filled. Once candidates are confirmed for all open positions, the committee submits this list (known as the 'slate') to the Vestry for the November meeting.

IV. LEADERSHIP REPORTS

RECTOR

From The Rev. Dawn M. Frankfurt

TWENTY-TWENTY-THREE

The slow retreat of COVID and its consequences continued for St. James Church in 2023. Attendance at worship gradually improved, but did not return to pre-pandemic levels. Worship services online continued to be appreciated. Once the program year began in September, we more regularly saw in-person attendance at the 10:45 a.m. service exceed 100. We gathered with 100 more worshipers at Christmas 2023 than we did in 2022. While we observed more children at worship and in the nursery, participation in the weekly youth group faltered with the exception of a few perennially loved happenings. Coming to parish-wide events, such as the 4th Sunday Lunch, BINGO night, and Advent Lessons & Carols (followed by dinner) was popular and contributed to a growing optimism about rebuilding our community here.

As you will read in the financial reports presented in this publication, the generosity of our members was considerably strengthened. Years of parishioner support has resulted in a parish facility low on needed maintenance. While financial reports were carefully balanced, a projected deficit of more than \$20,000 was eliminated and we ended the year "in the black."

One aspect of a protracted return from COVID which kept nagging at us was the muted participation of volunteers in all areas of parish life. In addition to fewer hands on deck, the commitment of volunteers occasionally left us wanting.

To our benefit, changes to parish personnel slowed significantly in 2023. The year of a variety of organists and choir directors ended in August as Dakota Bennett was hired as our new Music Director. In August we observed the one-year anniversary of our terrific parish communicator, Krystal Poindexter, while Jose Alonso, Susie Stallings, and Chelsea Whipple remained essential to parish operations.

We began 2023 with the expectation that the new CEO of Breakthrough/ESS, Father Andy Houltberg, could

serve in worship at St. James one weekend per month. As events of the year unfolded, his skill set was needed at Good Shepherd Church. Good Shepherd is seeking a new rector while servants like Father Andy fill in for a permanent priest.

Our Deacon, Jeff Roper, completed his first year serving as Archdeacon of the South for the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas. With on-going constraint of our clergy resources, Lay Worship Leaders coordinated worship servers, covered empty roles in worship, assisted in leadership at our worship services. As our congregational demand for pastoral care from clergy grew, our resources to meet those needs did not. I am concerned that as the quantity of demands for pastoral care increase, the quality of the care I can offer alone decreases. It is my hope that in 2024 we will see a return to the use of a team of individuals who provide the important ministry of pastoral care.

The vestry of St. James - directed by the Holy Spirit and serving with an eye on the balance sheet - refocused their concentration on three areas of parish life: increasing our interaction and recognition among our surrounding community; developing congregational vitality through by incorporating new members and encouraging the engagement of existing members; and growth and inventiveness for the youth ministry of the parish. The 4th Sunday Lunches are a product of new ways to interact with the youth of St. James.

And finally, the Stewardship Committee gratefully welcomed its new chairperson, Cheryl Schmeidler, who brought new energy to the fundraising of the parish. Following a successful annual campaign in 2023, we hope to see her continue as our leader in this area for years to come.

Good things are happening and taking root at St. James. Our work is relational and incremental as members deepen their faith and are further formed as Christians. Many of the seeds we are planting today will bear fruit in years to come. I hope you will be one of the sowers as well as one of the reapers.

ARCHDEACON

From The Ven. Jeff Roper

I completed my first full year of being an Archdeacon covering the southern part of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas. I continue my service as deacon at St. James Church, but I have accompanied Bishop Cathleen Bascom on her annual visitations to Episcopal churches in Ark City, Chanute, El Dorado, Iola, Newton, Sedan, Wichita (Good Shepherd, St. Bart's, St. John's), Winfield, and Yates Center. Besides serving as chaplain for the bishop in the worship services, I give a testimonial and invitation to those in the congregation who may sense a call to becoming an Episcopal deacon.

At St. James, I serve as deacon when I am in Wichita. I preach once per month and assist Mother Dawn with pastoral care visits. I am a Middle School and High School youth group leader and Confirmation teacher for our youth. I am a member of the Education for Ministry (EFM) alumni group which meets weekly.

I am also very involved in prison ministry at the Winfield Correctional Facility (a minimum-security facility in Winfield which houses 550 men). I preach and conduct Morning Prayer Rite II services every other month at the prison chapel. I also serve on the Board of Directors for the construction of a Spiritual Life Center on the Campus of the Winfield CF.

I am most proud of the work our congregation has undertaken over the past three years to donate and supply Greeting Cards for All Occasions to the inmates so that they may send cards of love and care to their friends and loved ones throughout the year. It is truly a powerful ministry to those men.

I look forward to serving with all of you in 2024.

We've had 3 very dear, special members pass away in the last few weeks alone - Helen, Pat and Delmar. As I read about ALL of the incredibly special gifts that they shared with the world and St. James, I was in awe. I am currently taking the class to become a member of the Daughters of the King Prayer Order and in our lesson this week, which was so amazingly taught by Kelly Harper, we learned about the Sevenfold Gift of the Holy Spirit. This is a single gift with 7 attributes, given to Jesus at his Baptism, in fulfillment of the prophecy in isaiah. This seven-fold gift is also given to the US at our moment of baptism, and as we grow spiritually, and as our faith matures, this gift from the Holy Spirit evolves within us. JUNIOR WARDEN

Taking a moment to review the progress on our 100th Anniversary projects funded by our successful Capital Campaign, we are closing in on completion. To recap: our sound system was modernized and enhanced, the lighting in the nave and chancel has been upgraded with enhanced controls and more lighting added as well as being totally LED saving energy. Beautiful new pew cushions have been installed, for the first time in 100 years we don't sit on hard wooden seats. The lounge carpet has been replaced along with a bit of updated furniture. The original entrance doors to the nave have been rebuilt, panic hardware installed and weather-stripped. The entire exterior has been cleaned, tuck pointed and sealed. All of the roofs not replaced under the original insurance claim have been replaced making every roof on our building new. This leaves the installation of two elevators, one going down to the original basement and one going up to the Education area, a remodel of the two upstairs restrooms and a re-organization of the choir seating area to complete. The elevator project has struggled with retrofitting this structure into a 100+ year old building. We have had to reevaluate the project and move the basement elevator to a new location. All the required planning is moving forward and should be ready to go forward very soon. The elevator to the upstairs is much less problematic and will follow immediately after. The remodel of the upstairs bathrooms is at the architect and will follow the elevator project. Dakota is in the process of evaluating the choir seating in the chancel and will have his proposal to us soon. As the remaining pledges are completed all of these projects should be fully funded.

With repairs and improvements to our mechanical systems utility consumption and costs have continued downward in spite of rising energy costs. The money invested in maintenance is being returned in overall lower costs. We continue to look for efficiencies in overall building operation as we continue to try and align our older building with conserving our natural resources and our footprint on the planet. This summer we selectively watered lawns and gardens to minimize water consumption. I want to thank everyone for the continued support through financial and physical (labor) contributions which allow us to continue to support both our church and its impact on the greater community.

TREASURER

From Woody Swain

Going into 2023, we recognized that it was going to be a financially challenging year, as our budget for the year forecast a shortage of -\$24,539. By last November, it was clear that we were going to need extra funds in order to finish the year. So, starting with "Giving Tuesday", just after Thanksgiving, we made our congregation aware of this need. The result was a generous \$32,500 of additional giving, allowing us to end 2023 with an overage of \$470! So, thanks to excellent follow-through on 2023 pledges, this extra giving, and expenses that were \$20,593 less than budgeted, we entered 2024 "in the black"!

Our 2024 Stewardship Campaign recognized that we needed to increase our pledged income significantly over 2023 in order to balance 2024's budget. This was due to 3 main factors:

- 1. The -\$24,539 shortfall in our 2023 Budget
- 2. Our Diocesan Apportionment would not benefit from the one-time credit of \$18,598 that it received in 2023, thus it was increasing by \$29,075 for 2024
- 3. The Fleming Bequest that provided \$20,684 in 2023 had been exhausted

TREASURER'S REPORT (continued)

Therefore, this Campaign's ambitious goal was to increase pledged revenue by 15% vs. 2023's.

The response from our congregation has been encouraging. We've received 116 pledges totaling \$473,391, which is an increase of \$40,261 (9.3%) over 2023's \$433,130 from 128 pledges. And, the average pledge increased by 20.6%, from \$3,384 to \$4,081. To supplement this, we plan to use \$24,000 of last year's gift from Betty Shaw's estate to help fund our Christian Formation ministry. And, the Vestry approved an increase in 2024's Endowment Fund distribution from 4% to 5%.

Our 2024 expenses, excluding the effect of the Apportionment, are forecast to increase by \$19,501, or 4.0%, over our 2023 Actuals, and we are maintaining all of the ministries and activities that we have previously funded. Thus, the 2024 Budget approved by your Vestry shows a shortfall of -\$17,032, which is \$7,507 better than 2023's and should be manageable, based upon past experience.

As for our 100th Anniversary Capital Fund - of the \$470,854 that was either donated or pledged, a total of \$421,741, or 90%, has been received so far. The Fund's balance is \$156,783, and final, 3rd year pledged amounts will be coming in during 2024. Major improvements to the flat roofs, stone and brickwork, and the heating system have been made, and the first of two elevators is planned to be installed in the first half of 2024. This campaign funded a significant Outreach project at St. Francis Ministries and will be funding other worthy causes in the future.

January 2024 Report to Annual Parish Meeting

Summary of 2023 Activities

- 1. St. James Church Legacy Society. The purpose of the St. James Church Legacy Society is to appropriately acknowledge those who have made a commitment to include St. James Church, the "Perpetual Memorial and Endowment Fund of St. James Church, Wichita, KS," or other Episcopal entity as a beneficiary in the disposition of their estate. Individuals may elect to be listed as "Anonymous." We give thanks for the 41 current enrollees (representing 60 individuals) for letting their light so shine that others may see their good works and do likewise!
- 2. We published the tenth annual report of the "St. James Perpetual Memorial and Endowment Fund (PMEF) & St. James Legacy Society." The report, published annually, identifies all memorial and thanksgiving gifts given through December 31st of the prior calendar year. During 2023 we realized \$ 76,778 in new Bequests, Tributes & Memorials. We continue to encourage St. James members and friends to participate in this program by inviting gifts of all sizes (initial minimum \$100) to perpetually recognize and honor the memory of loved ones as well as to celebrate and offer thanksgiving for significant
- 3. We continued to provide regular reporting of events in every edition of SEASONS, our parish printed newsletter.
- 4. We met regularly to monitor the Endowment Funds investment accounts and after examination of the September 30th accounting we recommended to the Vestry the 2024 Endowment Fund Distribution based on 5% of the average of the prior 12 calendar quarter balances of the invested funds. The Vestry approved a distribution \$50,530 to be allocated: (1) \$5,053 for outreach; (2) \$2,500 retained by the EFB for general expenses incidental to the management and administration of the endowment and legacy society programs; (3) \$17,621 to be retained in the endowment as a separate account for future capital needs; and, the balance of \$25,356 to be as directed by the vestry for 2024 capital expenses.

We will continue to encourage, invite and nurture active participation of members and friends of St. James Church to support the Perpetual Memorial and Endowment Fund and membership in the St. James Church Legacy Society in order to grow in perpetuity our Endowment Funds for the support of our community of faith, hope and charity. EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY (EFM)

The seminar group is the nucleus of the Education for Ministry program. Our group consists of six participants: LoWaine Robison, Terry Anderson, Elizabeth Wenger, Paul Leeker, Danny Blair, and Heather James. We meet weekly through the academic school year. EfM is a four year program administered by the University of the South. The first two years are spent reading the bible and accompanying texts; the third year covers church history; and the fourth year's readings are theology and religion. We work on developing skills in Theological Reflection during which we examine our beliefs and their relationship to our culture and the tradition of our Christian faith.

BASIC A

From The Rev. Dawn M. Frankfurt, Rector

Those who enrolled in Basic A in 2023 were a combination of people. Some were new to the Episcopal Church, some were returning after decades away, and some took part simply for a refresher. The comradery in this class is always strong and new friends and connections are part of the experience. Basic A is a class about the Anglican Communion, the Episcopal Church and the parish of St. James. It is adult confirmation class. This is usually at least an 8-week course, but it was shortened in 2023 under special circumstances. Basic A for years has been offered in preparation for the bishop's annual visitation. This was typically in November; however, in 2023 (and again in 2024) the visitation was on the first Sunday of October. In order to cover all of the topics of the course, it started in August rather than the usual September. The summer start time may have to some extend impacted enrollment. In general, people are not yet of the mindset to sign up for a fall commitment. Confirmation and the bishop's visitation will be on October 1 in 2024, so we will have another early enrollment. Areas of study include: the Anglican Communion; Church History; Holy Scripture; Holy Sacraments; Ethics; Liturgy, Worship and Ritual; Book of Common Prayer; and Prayer. At the 2023 service of confirmation on October 7 were confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church.

CONTEMPLATIVE PRAYER GROUP

From Chelsea Whipple, Director of Programs



CREATION CARE

The four goals for Creation Care work in 2023:

- 1. Engage the congregation
- 2. Care for the native plants
- 3. Advocate for the environment
- 4. Collaborate to seek funding support which will assist the church in becoming energy efficient.

Engage the congregation: Members of Creation Care read and share updates on the environment but we know that the congregants want to keep current on local, state, national and international initiatives. We share articles among our group and then select some to share via eTower. Creation Care member Elizabeth Wenger preached on the care of our world and God's plan near Earth Day in April and created an insert for the bulletin focused on the environment. She also shared several creation-themed books on the Creation Care web page. We hosted a table at Start Up Sunday signing up new members interested in working toward a more sustainable world.

<u>Care for the Native Plants</u>: Members of Creation Care planted only a few new native plants on the Yale side of St. James this year. Instead, we focused efforts on saving the plants we had and organized a water crew who were diligent in their efforts to brave the hottest days to ensure the plants survived while targeting the water to the neediest areas. Thanks to others who weeded the gardens, watered where needed and especially to Anne Clarke, her Dad, Tom Snyder, and the Boy Scout Troop for mulching. We are currently researching the requirements to become a Monarch Certified Waystation in 2024.

Advocate for the environment: Under the leadership of Mary Sloan who monitors state and national legislation, we are regularly contact our elected officials to support or reject legislation that might impact the environment. This past year we followed closely the international conference known as COP28 held in Dubai, the drought in western Kansas and its impact on the Ogallala Aquifer, and efforts to restrict single use plastic bags in Wichita.

Collaborate to seek funding support: In April, Danny Blair and Claudette Johns completed an Energy Audit of the church's interior. The purpose of the audit was to determine how St. James congregants could be better stewards of the earth's resources by caring for the building and, as a result, conserve the church's financial resources. This first audit provided a baseline of energy used and a summary of the energy-saving improvements made in the past five years. Creation Care also submitted a grant application to Interfaith Power and Light for purchase of a new chiller, additional insulation on the second floor and conducting a building envelope blower test. While the grant was unsuccessful, compiling information for the grant will help us focus our efforts in the coming years.

To raise funds for our Refugee Family Project, we held a quilt raffle for a beautiful quilt hand-sewn by Dottie Evans. Another effort to raise funds for this project with IRC, we held a Back-to-School Bingo dinner on August 4. Both fund raising efforts were successful.

In lieu of our May meeting, Mary Druding organized a Birthday Party at The Old Spaghetti Factory for Judy's birthday. We held a short business meeting, and a very good time was had by all.

Throughout 2023, we completed these projects.

- 1. American Red Cross Blood Drive: St. James held three American Red Cross Blood Drives during 2023. We also held a meeting with officials from the Wichita Red Cross to plan for ecumenical drives in the future. Chair Dottie Evans and Assistant-Chair Sarah Robinson
- 2. IRC Refugee Project: After raising funds, our parish received a family of six, a mother and five children ranging from one year to seventeen years and coming from the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Serving on the core committee are Suzanne Laycock, Jessica Moore, Chase Moore, Deb Bagby, Suzi Miner, Linda Guyot, Rachel Muscat, Clay Bastian, and LoWaine Robison. Others who helped move the family to the temporary and/or permanent apartments are Kate and Todd Miller and Judy and Hew Goodpasture. Jose Alonso helped with furniture donations and storage. We are most grateful for the very capable and well-organized efforts of Co-Chairs Suzanne Laycock and Jessica Moore.
- 3. Pocket Change Ministry: During 2023 we gave \$3500. to five agencies serving children and families. Specifically, we gave \$500. to Breakthrough ESS; \$500. to the Kansas Children's Service League; \$1000. to St. Francis Ministries; \$1000. to the Wichita Children's Home; and \$500. to the International Refugee Committee for the St. James Refugee Project. Since 2014 this project has contributed \$23,750. to community charities. Chairs: Vicki Evans and Project Founder Gary Thudium
- 4. Alternative Gift Market: We publicized the Alternative Gift Market's location, time, and dates of operation in the eTower. Chair: Suzi Miner

- 5. Christmas Food Baskets and Gift Cards: Twenty-one large food baskets as well as gifts for each recipient were delivered to twenty-one families served by St. Francis Ministries, Kansas Children's Service League, and IRC. St. James' generosity made Christmas happier for needy people this year! Special thanks to the many parishioners who contributed food and gifts, to the Youth Group for filling baskets, and to all who delivered baskets. Special thanks to Jenny Kroeker, Jeanne Kroeker, and Jose Alonso for their help. Chair: Mary Druding
- 6. Undies Sundays: Our spring project provided more than 1000 items of underwear, and diapers for the Wichita Children's Home. Kim Pennington from the Children's Home expressed sincere gratitude. Chair: Mary Klocke
- 7. Water Bottles for Breakthrough ESS: During the summer months, carloads of water bottles were delivered each month to Breakthrough ESS for their clients. Chair: Mary Druding
- 8. **Back-to-School Supply Drive**: Our drive for school supplies to assist The Pando Initiative, as it serves needy children in USD 259, was very successful. A heaping carload of supplies were delivered to the **Pando Initiative**. Chair: **Hew Goodpasture**
- 9. **Aluminum Pop Can Pull Tabs** for the **Ronald McDonald House.** A box for the receipt of pop can pull tabs has been placed in the entry. **Chair: Vicki Evans**
- 10. **Saturday Sack Lunches for the Homeless:** As part of St. James's cooperation with the Diocesan Minster program, sandwich sack lunches were prepared by St. James volunteers in several months. They were delivered to St. John's Episcopal Church for distribution. **Chairs: Joan Bledsoe** and **Jessica Moore**
- 11. 9th Annual Blanket Drive: Our parish contributed 75 blankets for the homeless shelters sponsored by HumanKind, and we provided 14 blankets for our refugee family. Chairs: Judy and Hew Goodpasture
- 12. **Reality U Volunteers:** St. James sent volunteers to several Reality U finance workshops.
- 13. Cards for Parishioners: Throughout the year, volunteers continued to send cards to ill or grieving parishioners.
- 14. **Greeting Cards for Inmates** at the **Winfield Correctional Facility.** Hundreds of new cards for various occasions and a huge load of Christmas cards were delivered to the Winfield facility. Chair: **Deacon Jeff Roper**.
- 15. **100 Year Charitable Project at St. Francis Ministries:** During 2023, thanks to the painting skills of **Gene Carr**, donations from our parish, and willing workers, we completed the refurbishment of the fifth Family Visitation Room. Every four to six weeks, we cleaned and restocked these rooms. Chair: **Judy Goodpasture**

In January the Outreach Committee will recommend a charity to receive the 2023 **endowment community gift** of more than \$3000. The Vestry will approve this recommendation.

I am thankful for our most generous congregation and for the dedicated members of the Outreach Committee. St. James parish exhibits remarkable compassion for the needy in our community. MUSIC MINISTRY

From Dakota Bennett, Director of Music

January 2023 began with the return of The Bell Choir after a fall hiatus. From January through May, The Bell Choir and Adult Vocal Choir were led by Warren Kim. Choristers were led by Kennedy Compton and Christy Manning. Organists Marcia Hansen, Christy Manning, and Dean Roush covered most services with some 8:30 Sunday services having either piano (with Barb Orsak at the keys) or no music. A music committee consisting of Adrienne Edwards, Erin Compton, Kennedy Compton, and Randy Harrison assisted Mother Dawn in selecting hymns. Adrienne Edwards served as coordinator for the music program. This team came together after Marlene's retirement and my departure through the Episcopal Service Corp. in summer 2022. They did an incredible job and are just one of many examples of how this parish is willing to be flexible, creative, and innovative to meet new challenges to the church in the 21st century where traditional music directors are more scarce than we once were.

On 20 August, I began my tenure as music director. Kennedy Compton remained with Choristers only through Christmas due to beginning student teaching and approaching college graduation this semester. I am grateful for her assistance in my first few months. At the close of 2023, we have The Handbell Choir which rehearses weekly on Tuesdays at 7pm and plays in church on an occasional basis; The Adult Vocal Choir which rehearses weekly on Wednesdays at 7pm and sings in church most weeks at the 10:45am service and on other special occasions; and The Choristers (children's vocal choir) which rehearses weekly on Wednesdays at 6pm and sings in church twice a month at the 8:30 service and on other special occasions. WORSHIP SERVICE VOLUNTEERS

From The Rev. Dawn M. Frankfurt, Rector

Our new system of scheduling worship volunteers through REALM has steadily improved through 2023 as the software has been fine-tuned and users of the scheduling system become more familiar with it. Our parish communicator, Krystal Poindexter, has contributed a great deal more time and energy to scheduling than we expected. This is a demanding ministry with personnel changes for each service forever in flux. In 2024 we will be looking for ways to support people in their commitment to show up for assigned service.

Scheduling volunteers (altar guild members, ushers, lectors, chalice bearers, acolytes, torch bearers, and occasional thurifers for incense) for weddings, funerals, seasonal, and special services is haphazard and happens outside the normal

process. We need volunteers to take an active part by identifying themselves in advance to serve at any extra service.

Every aspect of parish life is rebounding from our COVID experience at a different rate. Serving at worship has been one of the slowest areas of ministry to be re-populated by volunteers. All services at St. James are in need of volunteers of all kinds. These include:

Ushers are wanted to identify themselves, attend a training meeting, and sign up for regular, scheduled participation. The scheduling of ushers for weddings, funerals, and special services is haphazard and happens outside the normally

Members of the Altar Guild are a constantly evolving group and new participants are readily welcomed. Adrienne Edwards, the chairperson of the Altar Guild, often serves at more than one service each weekend. The hope is to have enough altar guild members so that responsibilities can reasonably be spread among many people.

Lectors (readers of scripture lessons) are in good supply for the 10:45 service. The same is not true; however, at any other service. We need those who volunteer for the popular time at 10:45 to consent to serve at other services as well. Those who are lectors may find it an easy growth opportunity is to both read the lessons assigned and bear one of the chalices. We will offer training for anyone who would like to add serving as a Eucharistic minister (a chalice bearer) to their reading duties. You will be warmly welcomed into such a ministry.

Responsibilities assigned to acolytes, crucifers, and torch bearers (and sometimes even lector and chalice bearer) are often collapsed into duties managed by one individual. This is done out of necessity (for lack of volunteers) and often means that finer parts of our ritual are left undone. For instance, ringing the Sanctus bells, closing and opening the gates of the altar rail, participating in the gospel procession, and carrying a candle alongside the gospel or the cross are duties often left unassigned. When this happens, the liturgy runs less smoothly than it potentially can run. Volunteers serving in these capacities are to be commended for their ability to multi-task. They are very appreciated and underrecognized.

WORSHIP SERVICE VOLUNTEERS (continued)

Our four **lay worship leaders** (LWL) have alleviated some of this pressure. Several roles they fill (on the fly) would usually be filled by other volunteers. The main responsibilities of lay worship leaders is taking part in leading worship services. They are meant to coordinate servers, lead congregational prayers, and preach on occasion. LWL generally serve in their capacity once every four weeks and they preach, on average, less than once every 8 weeks.

Chalice bearers, those who take on the sacred role of offering sacramental wine to worshipers, carefully and reverently pass the common cup to each communicant. They are in short supply. We will train you to be a chalice bearer. Please let us know if you are interested in learning about this duty. Many who are now serving as lectors could easily grow into this ministry. Bearing the chalice and reading one or more of the scripture readings can be done by one individual at a single service.

ALTAR GUILD

Mary Druding and Dana Stelter who are chalice ministers for the Saturday 5:30 service cleaned up after the service and prepared everything necessary for the 8:30 service, which made them honorary Altar Guild members. I would also like to acknowledge the work that Linda Guyot did in preparing the palm fronds so we could make Palm Crosses for Palm Sunday. Thanks to Janet Newlin and Jane Spurrier for their dedicated efforts to wash and iron the drying towels and Eucharist linens throughout the past year.

During this past year we changed florists, we now use the Dillons at Douglas and Hillside for all floral items except the poinsettias and garland used at Christmas. In 2023 we replaced the white, green and red Sanctuary sets from memorial funds donated over past years. GUILD HALL PLAYERS

Guild Hall Players continues to be a valuable outreach ministry of St. James providing contact for the parish with the larger Wichita community, particularly people participating in the city's thriving fine arts scene. In 2023, GHP presented four productions: Chekhov's modern classic THREE SISTERS, Sondheim's romantic chamber opera PASSION, Shakespeare's comedy drama THE MERCHANT OF VENICE, and Luke Yankee's docudrama about the Titanic THE LAST LIFEBOAT. Over one hundred volunteers from the parish and the arts community were involved in putting on these shows. Audiences came from the city and the surrounding area and feedback from attendees always praise the quality and professionalism of the productions offered by a local parish. GHP is still often the first exposure to St. James for many in the volunteers and the audience providing them with a very positive impression of the parish.

Three productions are already scheduled for 2024: Noel Coward's classic comedy BLITHE SPIRIT, Robert Anderson's family drama I NEVER SANG FOR MY FATHER, and the musical HELLO DOLLY. Production expenses are covered by audience admissions, occasional memorial gifts, and unsolicited private donations to the designated GHP fund. GHP annually donates to the parish operating budget while not using any funds from that budget for direct production costs. All GHP participants continue to be grateful to the parish and its vestry for the gracious willingness to let this worthy endeavor to continue as part of life at St. James.




